Qualitative analysis of Criterion 1

The Raidighi College being a affiliated college prepares the academic calendar in accordance with the curriculum framed by the affiliating University. The college entrusts the Academic Subcommittee with the task of preparing Class Schedules keeping in mind departmental priorities for each semester. Individual teacher in consultation with the Heads of the Departments chalk out their lesson plans and initiate preparation of the teaching strategies in consonance with the course structure and a tentative teaching plan is shared with the students. Syllabus distribution, teaching plans and individual class records are maintained to ensure that the syllabus is completed within the stipulated time. The teaching plan is prepared and maintained through the use of Learning Management System (LMS) platforms like E-Shikshak and E-Shikshalay. Different methods for teaching-learning are employed including ICT tools, audio-visual aids, power point etc. Tutorial classes for each paper are held, special classes are arranged for slow learners as per requirement. The College Library provides Electronic Books, Journals, Magazines, Newspapers, etc. to the learners apart from the regular book lending services. Class tests, formative assessments, tutorial assignment submission are part of the Continuous Evaluation related to teaching-learning pattern. Excursions, field studies, institution/industrial visits are organized by different departments. The cross cutting issues gets reflected through Add-on/Certificate courses in and around the area of Value Education, organised by the NSS during 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2021-22 sessions. The IPR Cell of the college organizes discussions and awareness programmes on Intellectual Property Rights, to indoctrinate messages on Professional ethics. The Women Cell of the college regularly arranges for sensitization programmes, discussions in relation to the issue of gender. The Internal Complaints Committee and the Anti-Ragging Committee play a vital role in this regard. The NSS, as well as the Department of Food and Nutrition organizes awareness programmes to aware villagers, women folk in particular about the importance of personal and mental hygiene, food and nutrition. Human values are fostered through NSS activities in this cyclone-prone area. During the Cyclone Amphan in 2020, amidst lockdown, NSS units of the College had arranged for extensive relief work. Environmental concerns pertaining to awareness and conservation is dealt by the Life Science centred departments of the college and the Green Club. The syllabi focus on different dimensions of environment ranging from biosphere, ecosystem, ecology, biodiversity, sustainable development, renewable and non-conventional energy sources, resource conservation, environmental economics, environmental ethics, green chemistry and so on. NSS organised a special lecture on the occasion of Van-Mahotsav

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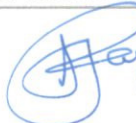

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

The College has been comprehensively trying to promote experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies amongst students through study tours, excursion etc. Over the past five years, the college claims that it has organised 36 Certificate courses for students. However the College should have more focus on implementation of the certificate courses and developve more certificate courses corresponding to local eco system. The College addresses through mentoring, addresses the problems faced by slow learners. Some of the class rooms are ICT enabled and teachers uses ICT tools in classes. Many classrooms are ICT-enabled with LCD projectors and screens. Departments are equipped with Desktops/laptops and Printers. Library uses the KOHA Library-Management software for books' circulation management. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is maintained and can be accessed. The college's Wi-Fi-enabled campus ensured that students and teachers had access to online learning resources like N-List. The college maintains various channels and communications are made through channels such as email, Telegram groups, and WhatsApp to stay updated on college-related matters. A Research Incubation Centre has been created in the College. College has designed its Internal Assessment (IA) evaluation process in accordance with University circulars. The grievance Redressal system is in place. Many of programmes offered in the colleges do not have specified Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs). There are no visible evidences/process how COs are disseminated among the students. It appears that there is no proper clarity and transparency regarding the POs and COs. The methodology and process for measuring the attainment of POs and COs, practiced by the College is convincing and clear. The College uses a Web-portal for mapping the Courses to PSOs and for grading all the Final semester students in accordance with the laid down PSOs. The portal measures the Attainment of POs based on both CGPA and the Faculty members' Grades

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 3

The College organises some activities related to the idea of innovation, which are designed and conducted by the IPR Cell of the college. The college has MOUs with a number of other Higher Education Institutes for the sharing of knowledge, library and research facilities. Faculty members from respective departments, especially pertaining to science stream, go to those institutions and faculty members from there come to our college. The College had one or two funded projects during the assessment period and also some publications by few faculty members. However, College does not have any ongoing research projects, neither there is any visible mentoring for encouraging projects and innovations. Some faculty members have attended seminars and conferences and published their papers. Many faculty members are yet to register for their PhDs. The NSS units of the College maintain liaison with the local community through its volunteers, by conducting various outreach activities. The College has taken steps to bridge the digital divide by setting up a Computational Laboratory which is well-functional. The College has started a project for mushroom cultivation (few days back), apiculture etc. centre recently to fit with local ecosystem and livelihood. If the projects are sustained, it can connect the college to the community. The College has received several accolades and acknowledgments by Govt. of West Bengal for its pivotal role during times of crises and its consistent support towards community welfare initiatives. During natural calamities such as cyclones Amphaan and Yaas, Raidighi College stands tall as a crucial center for Disaster Management. Its infrastructure and logistics have been instrumental in aiding the Block Development Officer in effectively serving the affected populace. Some awards received by the College are Green Award, NSS Award, and Nari Shakti Award.

Qualitative analysis of Criterion 4

The college has two separate buildings Administrative Building and Academic Building. There are total 32 classrooms, most of which as fixed LCD/LED projectors. There are also few portable projectors. The Science Departments have their own laboratories with equipment and elaborate specimen collections. The Central Computer Laboratory has a setup of 22 desktops, a laptop and various modern software with an LCD Projector for open class. The college has a Learning Management System (LMS) and Language Lab - Orell Talk Smart Version (Perpetual License) for 1 Teacher and 20 Student Consoles (Includes additional consoles) Up to 500. The Department of Geography has a Geoinformatics Lab with 16 terminals. The college has power back up system through generator and Solar Panel and a dedicated transformer. The college has a girls' hostel with capacity of almost 100 located nearby the college premises. However, only 20 girls live in the hostel. Therefore, hostel facilities are underutilised. The college also has adequate facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga Centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc. The college has adequate toilets both for staff, boys and girls and also disabled-friendly. The College library is largely automated with a collection of approximately 17000. The Library is automated using the Integrated Library Management System (KOHA). It has a 24x7x365 web OPAC search facility. There is an urgent need to improve the library facilities with more reference books, journals and e-resources. Library footfall by students and teachers are negligible. The library needs to be more organised and user friendly. Raidighi College has Broadband Services Wi-Fi facilities with 100 MBPS network speed for official purposes and 400 MBPS speed network for the students' academic usage. The offices is fully computerized as well. The college operates a total of Eighty Three (83) Desktop/PCs with UPS and 14 Printers- all are connected to the internet either through LAN or WiFi. Each Department has Wi-fi connections and laptops. The college runs customized online admission portal. The entire college is fully covered by CCTV Surveillance System and is monitored from the Principal's Room.

The College claims that active involvement of former students in supporting the educational journey of current students has created a supportive and nurturing environment within the college community. However, there is no documentary evidence to support this claim. Neither College has any evidence about financial contribution of the alumni.

The college has implemented NEP 2020 as per guidelines of the affiliating university, UGC and the State Government. Workshops were conducted on recommendations for 4-year UG courses. Orientation of staff & students were also conducted. College follows

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a decentralized and inclusive participation in governance.-the Principal, with approval from the Governing Body, shapes all major policies, from recruitment to fund mobilization. Institutional practices are overseen by statutory and non-statutory committees, endorsed by the Teachers' Council and/or the Governing Body. As a part of empowerment, college conducts various training, workshop, certificate courses and takes collaborative quality initiatives with other institutions Inculcating values, responsibilities: taught through community service, value education course, climate literacy, gender sensitization Inculcating electoral & constitutional literacy. Promote research activities, publications Collaboration with industry, international institutes. Certificate courses for skill enhancement Career counselling seminars/workshops Functioning of institutional bodies. Policies are formulated in accordance with UGC, state Higher Education Department, and Calcutta University guidelines, prioritizing student.

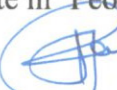
Qualitative analysis of Criterion 7

- Most of the faculty members and Principal live away from the College premises

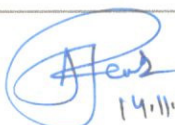
Opportunities:

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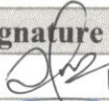
